#### PIAA DISPARITY

When the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association expanded classifications for most sports two years ago, teams in seven sports

entered a new paradigm.
The effects were felt The effects were felt most by schools vying for berths in respective dis-trict playoffs, especially in the top two classifications where sports expanded to six classes. While the decision was intended decision was intende to level the playing field for schools across the Commonwealth, the side effects were immediate.

In the case of basket -In the case of basket-ball, the disparity in num-bers is evident at a glance. There are 37 teams in 5A but only six in 2A. The number of teams eligible in each class is deter-mined by the total teams in that respective group.

mined by the total teams in that respective group. But how does that improve the optics of the postseason? Clearly, it doesn't, which opens the door for two questions: Was the PIAA trying to mimic other states who field teams in at least six classifications in power sports (foot-ball and basketball)? And, was the move made with the intent of prop-ping up the so-called "elite" programs in foot-"elite" programs in foot-ball and basketball?

The classification makeover was not without irony, something the Waynesboro varsity

football team experi-enced — well, sort of. In 2015, the final year of four classifications of four classifications in football, the Indians finished 6-4. Class AAAA consisted of 29 teams, with the top 16 qualifying for the district playoffs. The Tribe finished 17th in the district playoffs.

trict power rankings. Fast forward one year later. In 2016, Waynesboro finished 7-3 in 5A, which was also made in SA, which was also mad up of 29 teams. However, only the top eight teams played in the postseason. The push for expanded classifications had been on the docket for the past two decades. Now that it is a fact of life, schools are still coming to terms with

Based on male and female enrollments by sport, it might be simple math, but in the case of Waynesboro girls' basketball, is it fair to basketball, is it fair to have the Maidens in 6A? Remember, programs can choose to opt up but not down, meaning Waynesboro has to find a way to compete on the level of the Cumberland level of the Cum. Valleys of District 3.

# **Suspect in Kentucky school** shooting charged with murder

John Bacon and Justin Sayers

The 15-year-old student whose rampage at a rural Kentucky high school left two teenagers dead was charged with two counts of murder and 12 counts of first-degree assault, authorities said Wednesday.

Assistant County Attorney Jason Darnall said the shooter, whose name has not been released because he is a juvenile, was charged in juvenile court. Darnall said the will request that the case be transferred to adult court. Authorities previously said the teen would be charged with murder and attempted murder, but Darnall said the assault charge would be easier to prove than attempted murder and carries the same penalty.

Students at Marshall High School in Benton described a terrifying scene of gunshots, shock, panie and a wild scramble for safety on Tuesday. Bailey Nicole Holt, 15, died at the scene. Preston Ryan Cope, 15, died a short time later at a hospital in Nashville, Tennessee. Eighteen other teens were injured in the chose. If of them from gunshet wavant

Righteen other teens were injured in the chaos, 14 of them from gunshot wounds. "No one screamed," said Alexandria Caporali, 16. "It was almost completely silent as people just ran."

She said she was eating breakfast in the school's artium when she heard a gunshot and turned to see the shooter nearby. She said she knew him as a happy, quiet boy who played music. She took refuge in a classroom as shots continued to ring out.

"It was one right after another — bang, bang, bang, bang, bang, she said. Heather Ligon, mother of two teens at the school, said her sons described the shooter as someone who was cracking lokes whenever they saw him. Ligon ligo keeps was min. ing jokes whenever they saw him. Ligon said when she arrived at the school, her youngest son Bryan, 14, crawled to her in a panic.

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

#### St. Thomas man accused of trying to date teen, threatening her

ST. THOMAS - A St. Thomas man is in Franklin County Jail after a teen girl accused him of propositioning her for a date, then threatening her after she reported it to police.

Dwaine Richard Heinbaugh Jr., 30, is charged with felony intimidation of a witness or vietim, misdemeanor corruption of minors, indecent assault and summary citations of harassment, according to online court documents.

A 15-year-old reported Heinbaugh on Dec. 15, for allegedly making sexual advances and grabbing her thigh in the process, as well as propositioning her through Facebook, according to court documents.

The girl told investigators that Hein-baugh was trying to have sex with her, and referenced an incident from Thanksgiving, according to court docu-

The girl described Heinbaugh being at her house, driving with a relative and "acting creepy," according to court docu-

ments. She said Heinbaugh kept staring at her, was hanging out in her bedroom with her and her friends, and encouraging some of the friends to kiss in front of him.

When the girl was alone in her room, Heinbaugh allegedly came over and sat next to her, putting his hand on her right upper thigh, according to court documents. Heinbaugh allegedly told the girl I think we should date, according to court documents. The girl told police she told him no and that he was gross and a pedophile, according to court documents.

The girl told police she told him no and that he was gross and a pedophile, according to court documents. This upset Heinbaugh, so she left her room to get away from him. Heinbaugh then passed out in the girl's bed, so she slept on the floor, she told police. When she woke up, Heinbaugh was sleeping next to her with his arm around her, underneath her neck.

The girl played the video for investigators. In it, according to court documents, Heinbaugh could be heard 'yelling and screaming 'and telling the group 'Yeah I'm going to smack the s\*\*\* out of all of yall. She came onto me right. I have a recording right here on my phone."

Heinbaugh could be heard telling the group le had a recording of the group

Heinbaugh could be heard telling the group he had a recording of the group confronting him, because he had been recording all day long.

The girl's father confirmed what the girl had told him about what happened, according to court documents.

Police interviewed Heinbaugh on Jan. 26, and he admitted to being at the girls house around Thanksgiving, according to court documents. He originally claimed he was only there for about 10 minutes and did not have any contact with her. He claimed he only waved at her, and that he had never been alone with her or slept over at her residence.

When police confronted Heinbaugh with the girl's recording, Heinbaugh suddenly remembered an incident hat occurred with the girl, where she said 'I think you're cute,' according to court documents. Heinbaugh told police he couldn't give them any other specifies of the incident, and said he hadn't told police about it because he had forgotten about it.
